



On Ash Wednesday we began our new Lenten Lecture Series, Family of God as Covenant. It is encouraging to see such a great turnout of parishioners and others from the Diocese of Oakland who want to deepen their understanding of God love contained in the history of salvation. More importantly, it fosters a deeper love and relationship with God. I've decided to provide a brief synopsis of the first two covenants, Adamic and Noahic. Please realize that what's provided below is only a cursory understanding of the importance of God's unconditional love for all people.

#### Understanding Covenant

Covenant. The liturgies of ancient Israel, like the liturgies of the Catholic Church, are "signs of the covenant." For there is no idea more important to Scripture – and not idea more important to your life – than the idea of covenant. And the covenant cannot be understood apart from its divinely appointed signs – the liturgies of Israel and Jesus' Pasch (the Mass). A covenant is not a contract but contains some elements of contract. Contracts usually exchange property, goods, and services. But covenants exchange persons. Contracts set the terms for a business transaction. But covenants create a family bond. Covenants constitute families. God made His covenants in order to establish or renew a family bond with human beings, whom He has created in His own image.

The Adamic Covenant – God and Adam are involved in this covenant in which Adam represented the whole human race. Thus the judgment on Adam is the judgment on all humanity. The details of this covenant are found in Genesis 3:16-19. As the result of Adam's sin, the following curses were pronounced:

#### The Woman: Genesis 3:16

Eve and all women were made subject to three provisions.

- First: there would be multiplication of menstrual pain and conception. Apparently, the nature of conception before the Fall was quite different than what it was after the Fall. Since the Fall, a woman generally is able to conceive at least once a month. Furthermore, a woman's menstrual periods are often accompanied with discomfort and pain.
- Second: the woman was to give birth in pain. Before the Fall, she would have been able to conceive and give birth without pain, but this was no longer true. However, once birth takes place, there is joy (Jn. 16:21). In this way, the woman is saved (1 Timothy 2:15). She is not spiritually saved through childbirth, but she is saved from being in a demeaning position through her ability to produce children, for in this way she guarantees the continuity of the human race not subject to physical death.
- Third: the wife was to be in subjection to the husband. This was already true before the Fall, but the new element was that she would now have the desire to rebel against that subjection and choose to try to rule him.

#### The Man: Genesis 3:17-19

Adam and all men and the entire human race were subject to five provisions in Genesis 3:17-19.

- First: since Adam stands as the representative head of the human race, the judgment on Adam is the judgment on the whole human race. It is Adam, not Eve, who is held responsible for the human condition.
- Second: the earth was cursed. Working was not something new with the Adamic Covenant. The difference was in the earth's response. Under the Edenic Covenant, the earth was to respond readily to man's working and tilling. But now the earth would not respond so easily; there would be thorns, thistles, and weeds.
- Third: human diet continues to be vegetarian as it was under the Edenic Covenant; it is not clear if the same was true for the animal kingdom. Animals were used for dairy products, wool for clothing, and sacrifices, but not for eating.
- Fourth: man's work was to be characterized by hard labor. Working conditions under the Edenic Covenant were easy, simple, and enjoyable. Now, sweat was to characterize the work of man and labor was to be hard and toilsome.
- Fifth: physical death was introduced. Whereas under the Edenic Covenant man died spiritually, under the Adamic Covenant man would ultimately die physically (Rom. 5:12-21). Thus far there have only been two exceptions to this rule: Enoch and Elijah.

#### Provisions of the Noahic Covenant (Genesis 9:8-17)

Now we move into the second covenant God established with Noah known as The Noahic Covenant. The first provision actually belong to The Adamic Covenant but needs to be restated because the covenant God made with Adam is still in effect.

- First: confirms the Covenant with Noah – The covenant God made with Noah includes his sons, their descendants, all the animals on the ark and their descendants (Genesis 9:8-10).
- Second: man is promised by God the Sign of the Covenant – God promises the He will never again destroy all life on earth with a flood (Genesis 9:11).
- Third: man is promised by God that the Rainbow will be the sign of the Covenant for all ages to come (Genesis 9:12-17). The rainbow was the designated sign by God that the Noahic Covenant is still in effect. We believers have no fear that the earth will be prematurely destroyed.

**Gospel for the Fourth Sunday of Lent (March 30th)  
 John 4:5--15, 19b--26, 39a, 40--42**

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" — which means Sent —. So he went and washed, and came back able to see. His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is," but others said, "No, he just looks like him." He said, "I am." They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet." They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out. When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him.
