From the Pastor

Lenten Lecture Series Introduction - Overview

Throughout the Lenten Season we will travel the journey of our calling, by God, to enter into a deeper and more profound relationship with the Most Holy Trinity, as Christian women and men. We will have the opportunity of participating with the Holy Spirit to enter into an honest and integral assessment of who we are at this particular moment in salvation history. We will reevaluate the intent and spiritual ramifications placed upon us as followers of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Jesus is our only Teacher, *De Magistra*, according to St. Augustine. How do we continue to enter into the mystery of Jesus as the model and goal of our religious life and existence? I hope to share observations and encouragement to enter more deeply into the mystery that is the Triune Godhead.

What does it mean to be a *Holy Saturday People*? How do we enhance or reactivate the true meaning of Hope and Joy in our lay religious life? Are we content with a life of complacency, a life possibly filled with monotonous or boring routines? How do we balance a family or single life while still **being** faithful to the ministry that Jesus has called us to share.

In all that we hopefully will encounter during the Lenten Season; in the desire for rejuvenation of our commitment to follow Christ more deeply, sharing this mystery with our family and our sister and brothers; are we ready to surrender to God? Are we ready to enter more deeply into our Baptismal Promises? Where do we go from here?

Introduction

When it comes to spiritual maturity, we can't simply take for granted that we're growing. To evaluate personal progress, I've compiled a brief inventory of spiritual benchmarks. Check the list for an idea of how you're doing: weekly Mass attendance, personal bible study, private prayer, moral conduct, evangelization, and giving. But remember, these items are just a place to start; see the Bible for a complete growth chart!

We know we're growing spiritually when we become increasingly aware of our sinfulness and weakness. As I read biographies of godly saints, it's clear that they don't "get better" with age and spiritual maturity. Instead, they become ever more sensitive to their dependence upon the Lord. Moreover, progress is apparent when we respond to sin with quick repentance. Failure to deal with sin is rebellion against God. Growing believers turn away from wrongdoing and embrace righteousness. As we live with the good results of dependence and repentance, our desire to obey intensifies and the attraction of sin lessens.

Growth is also marked by an increase in two things—joy and struggle. Faith is often developed through hardship because living out the principles of trust and endurance help us "get it." So we'll see maturity in our relationship with God when we view trials and temptations as opportunities for growth. Paul, David, Ruth, Esther and Daniel prove that adversity can help form spiritual giants. These women and men recognized sovereign God as the gatekeeper of their lives. We are maturing when we perceive whatever comes our way as being from Him, which also means that He's working it for good (Romans 8:28).

Let us pray for one another during this Holy Season, especially for the poor.

**FROM BISHOP MICHAEL C. BARBER, SJ
BISHOP OF OAKLAND**

In the midst of the political complexity surrounding immigration in this country I am very pleased that the social service arm of our diocese, Catholic Charities of the East Bay (CCEB), is fully engaged. They have attorneys, law students, accredited paralegals, teachers and counselors providing legal, resettlement and employment services to very needy refugees and immigrants, our neighbors.

On Ash Wednesday I was happy to hear their fine work highlighted on a national NPR news broadcast. Parishes can reach out to CCEB to connect parishioners who need legal help by calling Maciel Jacques, Legal Services Program Coordinator, at (510) 768-3137.

Cardinal Sean O'Malley is co-chair of the US Bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development. He reminds us, "Immigration is not primarily a political problem, but rather a deeply human and profoundly moral challenge facing our nation." Catholic social services provide one of the refuges for those grappling with these very human challenges.

These challenges are world-wide. Speaking on the Italian island of Lampedusa, at the borders of Europe, Pope Francis said "We have lost a sense of responsibility for our brothers and sisters. We have fallen into the hypocrisy of the Priest and the Levite whom Jesus described in the parable of the Good Samaritan: we see our brother half dead on the side of the road and perhaps we say to ourselves, 'Poor soul' and then go our way." His words resonate in our part of the world as well.

I invite all to join voices with the California bishops: "We call on Congress and the President to work together toward a more comprehensive response to the humanitarian crisis of a broken immigration system. We will work with the California Congressional delegation and the President to accomplish that goal."



NEWS FROM FESCO

Why FESCO is Exploring a Strategic Alliance with Abode Services

All over the country, community-based organizations that combat homelessness are striving to get more bang for the buck. We in the Bay Area face an especially dramatic escalation in housing costs. The times call for innovation and creativity. The good news is that difficult situations inspire ingenious solutions.

How can we accomplish more with less? Our answer is to consolidate the operations of two organizations with complementary missions. After months of exploration and discussion, the Boards of FESCO and Abode Services propose forming an alliance between their agencies to gain leverage. By joining forces, both organizations gain in at least three ways:

- We improve management efficiency by enhancing our ability to achieve economies of scale, reduce overhead costs, maintain a reserve, and manage risk.
- As a regional organization, we gain visibility and credibility for fund raising, for applying for grants, for development applications, and for speaking out on preventing the causes of homelessness.
- We aggregate the skills that enable us to implement a new model for ending homelessness: affordable, well-managed housing combined with supportive services.

The heart of the matter for all of us is providing a stronger, more effective way for people at risk to get a new start. Want to know more? **Gospel for The Fourth Sunday of Lent
(March 15th) John 9:1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38**

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" — which means Sent —. So he went and washed, and came back able to see. His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is," but others said, "No, he just looks like him."

He said, "I am." They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out. When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him.
